
KEY FINDINGS

1. Adults in all ten states tested are generally concerned about the security of their personal data and malware when they download an app. But across states, without the protections provided by an app store, adults' level of *strong* concern increases by between +8 to +20 percentage points.
2. Similarly, after learning that legislation could pass that would bypass the review process for apps, across states, adults' say their level of *strong* concern increases by between +16 to +33 percentage points.
3. Around three-quarters or more adults in each of the states tested say they would be concerned about the security of their information when downloading apps if they knew that Congress is considering legislation that would make it easier to monetize consumer data.
4. And, nearly all adults (80%+) from the states tested say they do not want Congress to pass legislation that would eliminate or lower the security standards in the app marketplace.

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While large majorities of adults view each of the tested attributes as important overall, higher percentages of adults across states view security or safety as important.

When downloading an app onto your smartphone or tablet, how important, if at all, are each of the following? // Total Important




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Around four-in-five adults across states are concerned about the security of their personal data, and about malware being installed on their devices unknowingly.

Lesser-known small businesses currently sell their apps on app stores to enter the market, reach millions of potential users and grow their business. App stores require these small businesses to follow strict security standards to help keep users safe, their data secure, and prevent damage to devices.

■ Very concerned ■ Somewhat concerned ■ Not too concerned ■ Not at all concerned ■ Don't know/no opinion




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Across states, adults' level of strong concern increases by between +8 to +20 percentage points when considering their concern for the same issues without the protections provided by an app store.

As a reminder, app stores require small businesses to follow strict security standards to help keep users safe, their data secure, and prevent damage to devices.

 ■ Don't know/no opinion




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Compared to other states tested, adults in Georgia are more likely to be *very concerned* about the security of their personal data (63%) and malware being installed on their devices (60%).

Platforms currently have an extensive review process for apps allowed onto app stores to help keep users safe, their personal data secure, and prevent damage to devices.

Very concerned Somewhat concerned Not too concerned Not at all concerned Don't know/no opinion




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Across states, adults' say their level of strong concern increases by between +16 to +33 percentage points if legislation were to pass.

Congress is considering legislation that would bypass the review process for apps. If this legislation went into effect and eliminated the current security measures used in the app stores, there would not be a standard for security and consumers would be opened up to security risks like malware or unauthorized sharing of data.

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
Nearly all adults (80%+) from the states tested say they do not want Congress to pass legislation that would eliminate or lower the security standards in the app marketplace.

Across state lines, four in five adults (78%+) believe that small businesses should have to follow the same security standards as large businesses.


Do you believe that small businesses should have to follow the same or different security standards than large businesses?



After learning more, over half of adults (60%+) across states say they support the recently implemented programs that lower fees for small app developers.

Within the app store structure, all businesses have access to the same services for an annual fee. A couple of app platforms have recently implemented programs that reduce fees from 30% to 15% for any app developers earning less than \$1M per year. The more revenue an app generates, the more the app company pays for distribution.

And, over half of adults (56%+) across the states tested say they believe the fee reductions are fair to small app developers.
